Overview of the Children First Initiative

What is this?

This is a Charter Amendment that will

- Create the Children's Agency and the Children's Commission
- Coordinate funding for children, youth, TAY and families and SFUSD
- Establish funding conditions on City appropriations for SFUSD

What is the role of the Children's Agency and Commission?

- The Children's Agency will...
 - be responsible for aligning, and coordinating the development of systems, services, policies, and planning strategies to strengthen the City's services for children, youth, and families.
 - ensure data sharing across City departments to improve accountability
 - be the backbone agency to help move key children, youth, TAY and family initiatives forward
 - work with City departments and key stakeholders to create the City's Plan for Children, Youth and Families
 - be the single point of accountability for children, youth, TAY and family funding and services
 - create more transparency and accountability for the Children and Youth Baseline Fund
 - provide administrative support to DEC and DCYF and to their respective CAC's
 - provide direct staffing and administrative support to the TAY CAC
- The Children's Agency will **NOT**...
 - take over the grantmaking and implementation duties of DEC and DCYF
 - supplant Charter or State mandated funds that are directed to DEC and DCYF
- The Children's Commission will consist of 7 members who will set policy and provide oversight to the Children's Agency

Planning Processes

- The Children's Agency will be responsible for developing City's Plan for Children and Families
- The Agency shall undertake a robust community process in every supervisorial district, soliciting input from a diverse cross-section of parents, youth, non-profit organizations, and other key stakeholders
- The City's Plan for Children and Families will include an Outcomes Framework, Service Allocation Plan and Baseline Allocation Plan

How will it impact DCYF?

DCYF will continue to

- be responsible for administering the Children and Youth Fund and promoting the development of comprehensive programs, and planning strategies to enhance services for children, youth, TAY and their families
- hold grantmaking roles and responsibilities
- provide support to CBO grantees

DCYF OAC

- will continue to perform all the functions and duties it has now
- However, once the Children's Commission comes into existence on July 1, 2024, the OAC shall sunset.
- The Mayor and Board of Supervisors may appoint members of the OAC to the Commission

DCYF CAC









- The Children's Commission shall establish a Community Advisory Committee (CAC) to advise DCYF and the Commission on implementation priorities, policy development, the planning cycle, evaluation design and plans, and any issues of concern related to the Children and Youth Fund and other funding overseen by DCYF.
- The DCYF CAC shall engage a broad cross-section of community members and service providers in providing information, education, and consultation to DCYF and the Commission.
- The DCYF CAC shall be comprised of 9-15 members appointed by the Commission and can include DCYF-funded providers.
- Once the DCYF CAC will come into existence on July 1, 2025, the SPWG shall sunset

How will it
impact OECE
and F5?

What is DEC?

- OECE and F5 are in the middle of a massive merger to become the Department of Early Childhood (DEC).
- This merger is projected to be completed by June 30, 2022
- DEC shall be responsible for administering the Babies and Families First Fund (Baby Prop C), Preschool for All Funds from the Public Education and Enrichment Fund (PEEF) and promoting the development of comprehensive programs, and planning strategies to enhance services for early learning, babies and their families in accordance with the Early Care and Education for All Initiative.
- DEC shall also manage and oversee the First 5 Commission

What is the SFUSD part about?

	Area	Required Activities
	Strategy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Recruit, hire and evaluate the Superintendent and General Counsel, and allow the Superintendent (and not the Board) to manage other staff
	Fiscal Oversight	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Approve the annual budget and ensure that it aligns with the overall goals of the District, and not approve detailed items such as field trips, student transfer, and bus routes Request a financial impact analysis for all policy and practice changes that have five-year financial resource requirements totaling greater than \$5 million
	Separation of Duties	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Not perform administration or management functions that are the responsibility of the Superintendent and staff
	Community Engagement	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Conduct extensive parental engagement to ensure all voices are heard and considered by the District on key issues
	Governance Standards	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Model the highest standard of conduct and efficacy by: keeping student academic achievement and wellbeing as primary focus, treating others with dignity, assuming collective responsibility for building unity, managing effective Board meetings
	Professional Development	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Undergo regular trainings to ensure they have the expertise they need to conduct their jobs effectively Conduct annual self-evaluations to ensure they are working together as a collective body to achieve long-term goals, not as individuals chasing short-term political wins
	Annual Report	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Submit to Mayor and Board of Supervisors an easily understandable and succinct annual report
	Superintendent Roles and Duties	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Develop and implement the strategic plan, including receiving Board of Education and community feedback concerning the plan

What's the timeline for all of this?

- On December 14th, Mayor Breed introduced this Charter Amendment at the Board of Supervisors
- The Charter Amendment is co-sponsored by Supervisors Myrna Melgar and Rafael Mandelman
- The Charter Amendment will be heard at the Rules Committee (TBD)
- Once the Charter Amendment makes it out of the Rules Committee, it will be voted on at the Full Board of Supervisors (TBD)
- Currently, Supervisor Melgar and the Mayor's Office are meeting with key stakeholders and gathering feedback and suggestions to enhance the Charter language.
- If it can secure the necessary votes at the BOS, then it will go on the **June 6th ballot**.
